

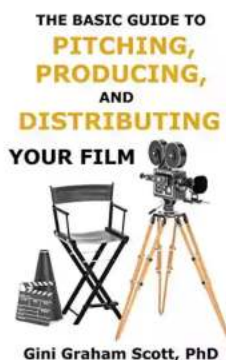

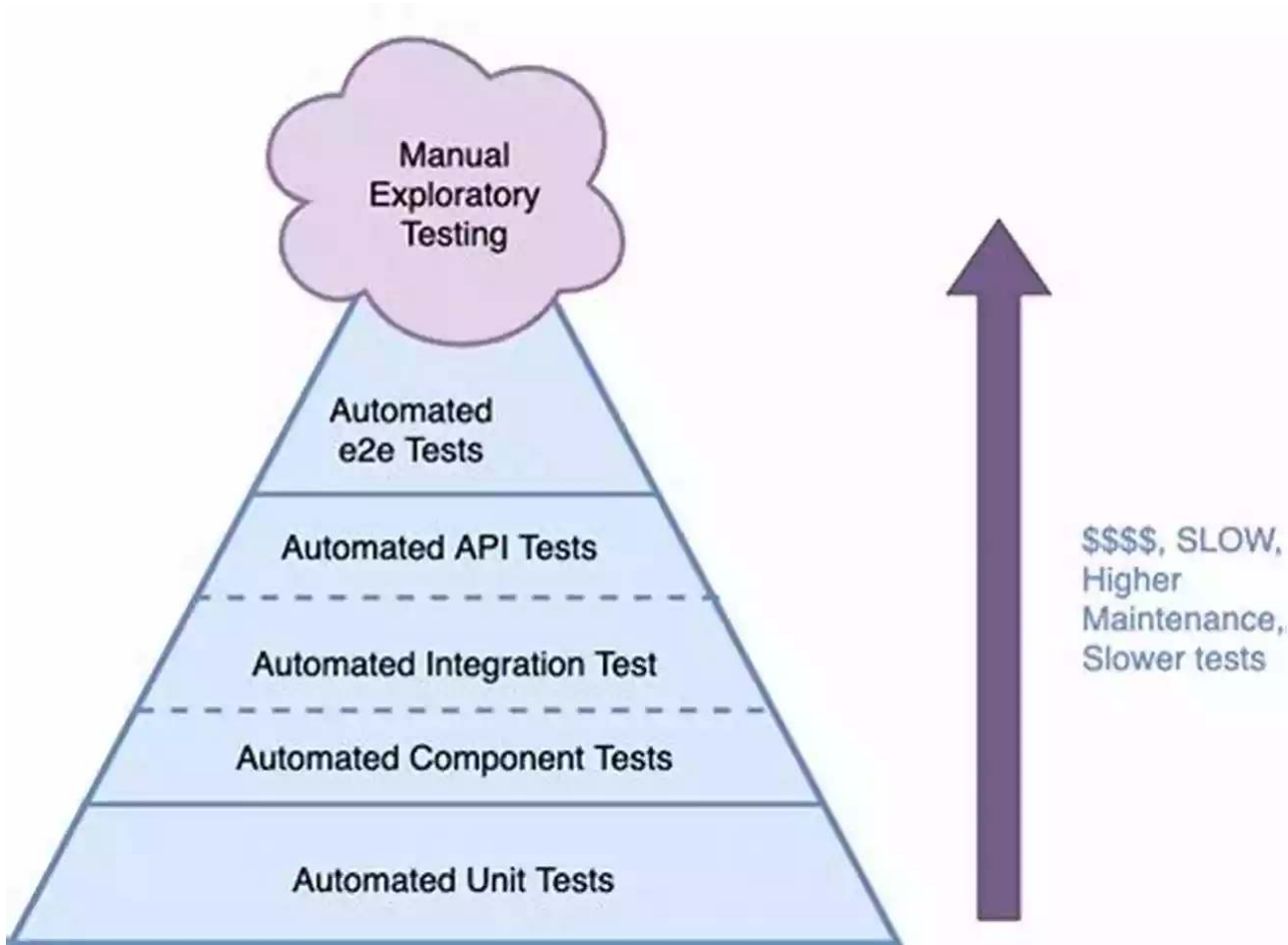

18. Consider self-distribution options if you want to maintain creative control over your film. Digital platforms and video-on-demand services offer opportunities for independent filmmakers.

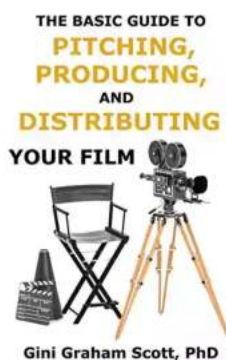
19. Ensure your film meets all technical requirements for distribution, including audio and video formats, subtitles, and international standards.

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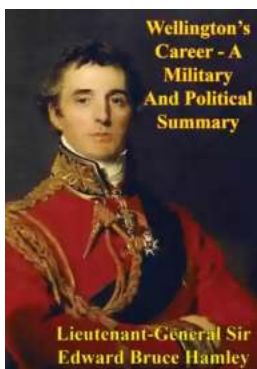

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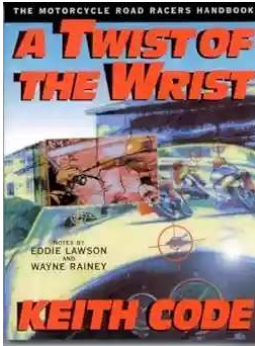
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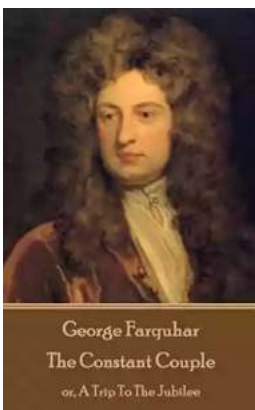
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
