
It's All About The Tongue

days are full. And then once in a while something unexpected comes along that takes even more time. Like the day the country ran out of gasoline.




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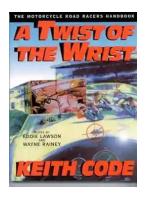
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
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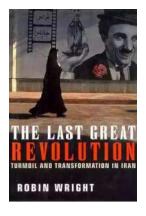
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
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
