

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Gerbils have been popular pets for a long time and almost everyone has heard of them. But how are they scientifically classified? Are they mice? Are they rats? Are they neither? First, we'll take a closer look at the systematics. The scientific name of the gerbils we will deal with in this book is "Meriones unguiculatus" and goes back to the French animal and naturalist Alphonse Milne-Edwards (1835-1900). Gerbils belong to the family of long-tailed mice (Muridae) and within this family to the subfamily Gerbillinae. The scientific term "Gerbillinae" already indicates the origin of the English name "Gerbil".

Gerbils have their home mainly in Mongolia - that's where the frequent name Mongolian gerbil comes from. From this it can already be seen that this animal lives in deserts, but it also inhabits steppes, dry grasslands and semi-deserts.

The gerbil's activities are not bound to a specific time, and they do not hibernate this makes them perfect pets for adults and children, as long as it is ensured that these social animals are allowed to live with friends of the same species.
