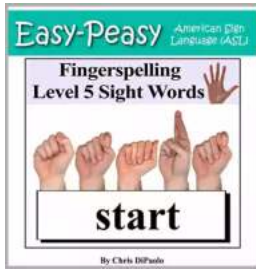

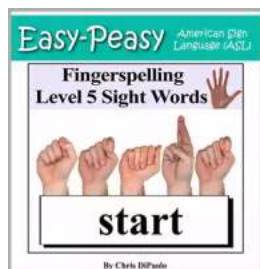

This book is designed to show you the basic 26 letters used in fingerspelling. To get practice signing, this book includes fingerspelling for Level 5 sight words.

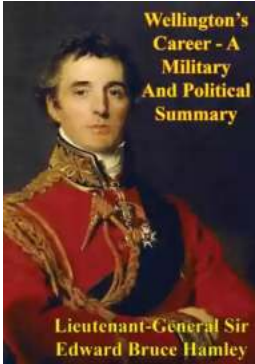
Level 5 Words included in this book:

So what are sight words? Many of the most frequently used words in English are difficult to sound out and instead, need to be recognized on "sight" for a child to become a proficient reader. Sight words can be known by other names as well including High-frequency words, Dolch words (named after Edward William Dolch, PhD who first compiled the list in 1936), Fry words (named after Dr. Edward B. Fry's who updated the list in 1996), Instant words, Star words and

more! The faster your child can recognize these critical words, the better, so practice, practice, practice!
