



Half Cross Stitch





Colours used are suggestions - DMC thread details are included if you wish to make as shown or you can change colours to suit.


Size on 14ct aida is approximately 3.29" x 2.93" (8.36cm x7.44cm) (46x41 stitches).

Can be used without the words for other occasions as well.



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
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
